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The Why: North American sagebrush ecosystems are a regional priority of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS). The FWS Science Applications Program is working in partnership with multiple USGS Climate Adaptation Science Centers (CASCs), and Boise State University, to develop a training series for sagebrush conservation practitioners. These trainings will begin in Feb. 2024 with a self-paced introductory course, a series of virtual classrooms, and an invitation-only in-person workshop in May 2024.
